



The horse is the most beautiful of man's conquests—as every equestrian will agree. To make this horse stand on its hind legs, all you need to do is fold the points again and find the balance point.






• Fold in the sides of a preliminary base (see p. 5).



2. Cut along the heavy line only as far as the folded edge, then unfold.




3. Fold down the points on both sides, front and back.




4. Sink the base after prefolding (1) (see p. 6). Fold the sides along the existing creases (2).




Origami Paper Animals



5. Mark the position of the head as the dotted line indicates and precrease the tail: one fold at right angles and a second fold dividing the resulting angle in half.



6. To make the mane, cut a point through all thicknesses; for the ears, cut a curve through all thicknesses.



7. Open the head and make a pleat fold to create nostrils.



8. Stand the ears up (1) before refolding the head with a reverse fold (2).



9. Make a reverse fold to form the mouth.




10. Like this.



II. Open the point to form the back, then push down inside the folds on each side.



12. Make a pleat fold to the inside to form the tail.




Make a reverse fold.



14. Open to the outside.



15. Narrow the base of the tail and shape the tip with a reverse fold.



16. For a trotting horse, make a reverse fold on one front leg and on the opposite rear-leg. Tip the head forward with a crimp fold on each side. To finish, give it a little volume.
